

How to Start a Business in Missouri Checklist

1.	Form your business. \square 1.1. Review Missouri formation options. \square		
	There are four main types of business structures in Missouri. Choose the one that		
	best suits your business.		
	1.2. Name your business. \square		
	After checking to see your name has not already been claimed by another		
	business, register your business name with the Secretary of State.		
	1.3. Get an Employer Identification Number. \Box		
	Apply for an Employer Identification Number with the IRS.		
	1.4. Register your business in Missouri. \square		
	Sole proprietorships and general partners do not need to file with the state. LLCs		
	and corporations must file online.		
	1.5. Obtain necessary permits and licenses. \square		
	Check the Secretary of State website to see if your business requires any special		
	licenses. If you do, apply for them online.		
2.	Register your business for taxes. \square		
	2.1. Apply for a state tax ID number. \square		
	Register for a state tax ID number with the Missouri Department of Revenue.		
	2.2. Register for sales tax. \square		
	Apply for sales tax with the Missouri Department of Revenue.		



	2.3.	Register for consumer's use tax. \square
		You must pay consumer's use tax if you make a purchase from a seller out of state
		without paying Missouri use tax.
	2.4.	Register for unemployment insurance tax. \square
		If you employ workers, you will need to register for unemployment insurance tax
		with the Missouri Department of Labor and Industrial Relations.
	2.5.	Register for withholding tax. \square
		This also applies to businesses that employ workers and can be done via the
		Missouri Department of Labor and Relations. Use the Missouri withholding tax
		formula to calculate your withholding tax.
3.	Hir	e employees and report them to the state. \square
	3.1.	Report your employees to the Department of Social Services. \Box
		Report new hires to the Department of Social Services within 20 days of their
		commencement.
	3.2.	Obtain workers' compensation insurance. \square
		This is mandatory for businesses employing five or more workers, unless you are in
		the construction industry, in which case you'll need to obtain this coverage if you
		employ one or more people.
	3.3.	Display mandatory posters in your place of business. \square
		Comply with the Missouri Department of Labor and Industrial Relations by
		displaying the seven mandatory posters. You should also display the applicable
		federal workplace posters.
